Jobs for the winter

Now is the time of year for fruit tree pruning, but only apples, pears and quinces - not the stone fruit, such as plums or cherries, which should be pruned in the growing season to help seal the cuts. The aim is perhaps to reduce the height (many of the site's apple trees are too tall to pick). Remove damaged, crossing- over or cankerous branches. Whippy water shoots should be removed, but some thicker ones can be left but shortened. Then there is thinning - some say you should be able to throw your hat through the tree's branches! Bear in mind that less is more - less fruit but higher quality.

We discourage burning the prunings - hire one of our chippers to produce chipping for mulch or use the twigs to make a wildlife habitat. You might like to try [biochar](#) to turn the twigs into charcoal to improve your soil.

Excellent quality chippings have been delivered by our friendly tree surgeons so do help yourselves to mulch for your fruit trees and bushes or to make paths on your plots. Don't forget you are also responsible for the paths next to your plots.

New pond for the HAA communal orchard



"Almost any water body, whatever its size, will have some wildlife value." RSPB

We are working with Highgate Primary School to create a new wildlife pond in the communal orchard behind the Shed Shop. The children have even offered

to help with the digging!

The plan is as follows:

- The pond will be modular i.e several mini ponds in an arrangement, not exceeding a water depth of 45 cm.
- It will be made from recycled materials..
- Pond water can be topped up with rain water collected from the Shop roof.
- Light for the pond will be increased by trimming the overhang of the apple tree to the right of the wheelbarrow.
- The approximate location of the new pond is marked by the wheelbarrow below



Ponds are an effective way to increase biodiversity in any environment. They provide a haven for all sorts of plants, birds and animals. They are complex habitats full of algae and plants, scavengers, predators, herbivores, decomposers and parasites. Some species spend their whole life in the pond - for instance, water snails and small crustaceans while others use it for part of their life cycle - e.g. pond skaters and dragon flies.

HELP NEEDED: do you have any of the following?

Old Vessels

The new modular pond will be built from several reused items. We are looking for the following:

- An unwanted metal bath tub or a galvanised steel vessel
- a barrel
- an old plastic builders trug (broken handles no problem) or a sturdy council recycling box (which has been put out of use through the new council wheelie bins).

Lining

Any leaking vessel will require a waterproof pond liner. Larger pieces of PVC packaging, for example packaging for a mattress or flat packed furniture.

Edging fabric

Fabric in pieces of no smaller than 40 cm in colours of greys, browns and greens. Pieces can be stitched together before laying them around the pond edges. This would bridge the pond edges and the surrounding earth. It would camouflage glossy and shiny edges and enable plant, roots and algae to attach and soften the pond surround.

A spare water butt

A water butt or barrel would be useful to collect rain water from the shop roof. It would be positioned in the orchard near the dead hedge to allow easy top-up of the pond.
